## Special Projects, Initiatives, and Accomplishments (University and Discipline)

<u>Bremer Distinguished Professorship</u> - Established collaboration between Project STEPP (East Carolina University) and the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders with Clinical Scholars – graduate students in CSDI and the Bremer Scholar. This collaboration involved multidisciplinary teaching, research, and service and will serve as a model for other UNC institutions in collaborative engagement involving students with learning disabilities.

Other initiatives as the Bremer Scholar included the following:

<u>Literacy Summit 2020</u> – Planning for the *Unified Disciplines of Literacy* - Literacy Summit which was to be held on April 24, 2020 at East Carolina University. After consulting with many of my colleagues in the field of speech-language pathology and related disciplines, I decided to organize the literacy summit to coincide with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction's implementation of MTSS (multiple tiers of systematic support) in 2020. This implementation will involve the collaboration and teamwork for professionals in the public schools, involving regular and special educators, school psychologists, counselors, and speechlanguage pathologists. I am collaborating with two other colleges/departments for this conference (Dr. Christy Walcott, Psychology; and Dr. Kristin Gehsmann Literacy Studies, English Education and History Education) for this interprofessional literacy summit. Dr. Charles Haynes, MGH Institute of Health Professions and Dr. Donna Scanlon – SUNY-Albany will be the Keynote Speakers this year, who are experts in the disciplines of literacy and language and application to MTSS in schools. University professors from the colleges of Education, Harriot College of Arts and Sciences, and Allied Health Sciences will be involved in this summit.

<u>Bremer Literacy Team</u> – Established many connections with the community relating to community service, literacy and language engagement with children in many settings. Dean of the Honors College, ECU – During my position as Dean, the number of student applications increased from 529 in 2013 to 773 2015, for a 27 % increase, with only 110 students being accepted as Honors College students and 20 EC Scholars annually from this enrolled student cohort. Fundraising totals from 2013 to July 2015 exceeded \$2.9 million. Under my leadership and campus collaboration, special affiliated academic programs and scholarships were developed and awarded including Music Scholars (College of Fine Arts and Communication - CFAC) and Humanities Scholars (Harriot College of Arts and Sciences- HCAS). Further collaborative efforts across colleges including the establishment of the Distinguished Artist-in-Residence (Bob Ebendorf) and a formal partnership with HCAS for the Voyages of Discovery Lecture Series and with HCAS and CFAC for the Nile Project. An EC Scholar fund was developed to support an EC Scholar majoring in engineering through a new relationship with DSM and a fund to award EC Scholars was established in memory of Ovid Pearce, ECU Professor Emeritus.

During my tenure as Dean of the Honors College, I also organized the inaugural Interdisciplinary Literacy Summit on May 21, 2014, as serving as the Bremer Distinguished Scholar. In partnership with Dr. Sarah Williams, Director of the Walter and Marie Williams STEPP Program, the campus-wide and community initiative was developed to facilitate discussions and partnerships relating to literacy-based challenges, including instruction, transitions between high school and college, research and interdisciplinary research. Following a keynote address by Dr. June Atkinson, North Carolina State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and welcoming remarks by Chancellor Steve Ballard, faculty from many disciplines across campus participated in the Literacy Summit including speech-language pathology (communication sciences and

disorders), special education, reading education, English, psychology, foreign languages, communication, anthropology, and sociology.
